

Medical cannabis label guidance

When buying medical cannabis, there are 2 types of labels that you want to read. They are the patient label and the product fact panel. You can use the labels to learn more about the products that you buy.

Medical cannabis patient label

This label may be attached to the medical cannabis product as a sticker or put in your shopping bag as a receipt or a piece of paper. **Always keep this label with your purchases** because if you're stopped by law enforcement while transporting medical cannabis, this label will show that you bought the medical cannabis legally.

The legal use termination date for flower. Once the legal use termination date passes, you can still use the flower you bought at your home, but you can't take it out of your home.

Medical cannabis flower fact panel

The information on this fact panel is only found on unprocessed flower. Other information like written warnings and symbols can be found all over the package but won't always be on the fact panel. **Always keep the fact panel on the medical cannabis products you buy.** Ask the pharmacist if you have questions about how to read the fact panel. **Always follow the dosing guidelines from your RMP and pharmacist.**

The product name and total weight of flower in the package. You can use the total weight to figure out how close you are to your monthly limit of cannabis.

The processor and the lot number. These will be used if there is a product recall.

The dates that the cannabis was harvested, tested, and packaged, and the batch number. These will be used if there is a product recall.

Each cannabinoid and how much is in the flower. You can use this to figure out the THC potency if it's not on the label. Multiply the percent of THCA by 0.87, then add the percent of THC. For this label that would look like $22.29 \times 0.87 = 19.39 + 1.18 = 20.57\%$ THC potency.

The flower's expiration date. The expiration date is different from the legal termination date. The expiration date is the day that the flower can no longer be sold in medical cannabis pharmacies. The legal termination date is 60 days from the day you purchase the flower. If you don't use the flower by the legal termination date, you can't take it out of your home.

The total weight of cannabis flower in the package, and the THC potency and milligram (mg) of THC for each gram (g) of product. Talk with the pharmacist about the THC potency in the products you buy because different potencies may be good for different medical conditions. You can calculate the potency if it isn't on the label.

Each terpene and how much is in the flower. Ask the pharmacist if there are terpenes that could help you. When looking at a label with terpenes, you'll want to look at the 3 with the highest amounts. The amounts may be in percentages or in mg. When they're listed in mg, it's the mg per each g of product in the entire package.

Medical cannabis concentrate fact panel

The information on this fact panel is only found on concentrate products, like gummies and vape cartridges. Other information like written warnings and symbols can be found all over the package but won't always be on the fact panel. **Always keep the fact panel on the medical cannabis products you buy.** Ask the pharmacist if you have questions about how to read the fact panel. **Always follow the dosing guidelines from your RMP and pharmacist.**

The product name and how much THC is in each piece. Talk to the pharmacist about how much THC each piece has so they can tell you how much to use each day or if you need to cut up a gummy or pill. Some products may include the ratio of THC to other cannabinoids, like CBD or CBG.

The total amount of THC per package. This can be used to figure out how close you are to your monthly limit of cannabis.

The batch number, when it was tested, and when it was packaged. These will be used if there is a product recall.

The types and amounts of cannabinoids in the product. Most labels will print these in milligrams (mg) per gram (g) for the whole package. To figure out the mg per piece, multiply the mg of the cannabinoid by the total weight of the package in g. Then divide by the number of pieces in the package. For THC on this package, it would look like $4.7 \times 90 = 423 / 10 = 42.3$ mg THC per piece.

The expiration date. Medical cannabis concentrate products don't have a legal termination date.

The total mg of THC for each g of product.

The ingredients and allergens.

The total weight of the package and how many pieces are in the package.

Which chemicals were used to extract the THC and make the product.
